| 39 | RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, That this |
| 40 | resolution may be cited as the "Firearms Safety Omnibus Emergency Declaration Resolution of |
| 41 | 2018." |

- Sec. 2. (a) As of December 12, 2018, there have been 155 homicides in the District of Columbia more than 100 of which involved the use of a firearm.
- 44 (b) Of the 139 homicide investigations conducted by the Office of the Chief Medical
 45 Examiner ("OCME") in 2016, the cause of death was a firearm in 96 cases, comprising 69% of
 46 homicides.
- 47 (c) Firearms were used in 6 of the 44 suicides investigated by the OCME in 2016. In 2012, 48 firearms were involved in 20% of the 44 suicides; in 2013, 15% of the 52 suicides; in 2014, 32% 49 of the 69 suicides; and in 2015, 29% of the 52 suicides.
- 50 (d) The Metropolitan Police Department recovered 1,870 illegal firearms in 2016, an 51 increase of 164 over 2015.
 - (e) Identical permanent legislation to this emergency legislation, the Firearms Safety Omnibus Amendment Act of 2018 (Bill 22-0588), is before the Council on final reading on December 18, 2018.
 - (f) This emergency legislation is necessary to immediately protect District residents.
- Sec. 3. The Council of the District of Columbia determines that the circumstances enumerated in section 2 constitute emergency circumstances making it necessary that the Firearms Safety Omnibus Emergency Amendment Act of 2018 be adopted after a single reading.
- Sec. 4. This resolution shall take effect immediately.
