10. Please list the ways, other than memoranda of understanding, that the agency collaborated with analogous agencies in other jurisdictions, with federal agencies, or with non-governmental organizations in FY15 and FY16, to date.

DYRS case managers collaborate with CSOSA, CSS, and Pre-trial services on case planning for committed youth involved with these agencies. We interact with MD juvenile justice system if a committed youth is detained in MD and we need to figure out case planning. We worked with community providers to get our youth emergency placements when we didn't have available or appropriate placements.

In addition, DYRS also collaborates with The Interstate Commission for Juveniles. The Commission is the governing body of the Interstate Compact for Juveniles, which ensures joint and cooperative action among the compacting states. They are commissioned to preserve child welfare and promote public safety interests of citizens, including victims of juvenile offenders, by providing enhanced accountability, enforcement, visibility, and communication in the return of juveniles who have left their state of residence without permission and in the cooperative supervision of delinquent juveniles who travel or relocate across state lines.

DYRS continues to collaborate with both governmental and non-government organizations in a variety of capacities. The most visible partnership is through the DC YouthLink program where we partner with Community Based Organizations (CBOs) providing vital services to our youth in our neighborhoods. Another way we partner across jurisdictions is through the Youth Employment Change Network meetings that are held for youth throughout the DC metropolitan area. We also work with a wide array of individuals and businesses through our Networking Engagement Breakfasts. The career fairs we host work with areas businesses to provide jobs to DYRS youth. Each year we also participate in the annual Criminal Justice Coordinating Council conference.
