WHEREAS, in that same 24-hour period, providers were nevertheless unable to meet approximately 20 survivors' requests for housing or emergency shelter, which translates to an estimated 7,300 unmet requests annually;

with 507 individuals utilizing the District's emergency shelters, transitional housing, or other

housing provided by the Domestic Violence Housing Continuum;

WHEREAS, in that same 24-hour period, 933 survivors in the District received services,

WHEREAS, of District residents experiencing homelessness in 2021, 44.1 percent of adults in families and 19.8 percent of single adults reported having some history of domestic violence victimization;

WHEREAS, according to the 2017 DC Women's Needs Assessment Report, Black women, who comprise only 52 percent of the adult women's population, accounted for 75 percent of the District's unaccompanied homeless women's population;

WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic has had a devastating impact on many communities and has exacerbated long-existing income and wealth inequalities that affect domestic violence survivors globally;

WHEREAS, in just a 2-month span during the COVID-19 pandemic, the National Domestic Violence Hotline saw a 9 percent increase in calls or contacts;

WHEREAS, compared to 2019, District service providers saw a 60% increase in the demand for services from survivors in 2020;

WHEREAS, in addition to the increased demand for services, local domestic violence service providers are reporting a significant increase in the lethality of domestic violence;

WHEREAS, economic stability and access to financial resources can be a critical determinant of a survivor's ability to leave an abuser or dangerous environment;

WHEREAS, since the beginning of the pandemic, more than 240,000 District residents have filed claims for unemployment compensation and, nationally, Black workers have had the highest national unemployment rate of any other racial group;

WHEREAS, the District must commit to addressing the racial, social, and economic inequities that are uniquely harmful to communities of color and that hinder many survivors from thriving after leaving an abusive relationship;

WHEREAS, there is a continuing need for survivors to have access to culturally-specific services which affirm their heritage, customs, sexual orientation, gender identity, and other lived experiences;

WHEREAS, service providers should receive adequate funding and support from local, regional, and federal governments to address the growing demand and greater need for housing, counseling, legal, and culturally-specific services;

WHEREAS, the goal of Domestic Violence Awareness Month is to improve awareness about domestic violence and outreach to residents and community members, and foster cooperation between public and private actors to end domestic violence in the District;

WHEREAS, the District can do much more to support survivors and service providers, and the Council will continue to partner with District agencies, community-based organizations, and residents to keep survivors safe; and

RESOLVED, BY THE COUNCIL OF THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA, That this resolution may be cited as the "Domestic Violence Awareness Month Recognition Resolution of 2021".

Sec. 2. The Council declares the month of October 2021 as "Domestic Violence Awareness Month" in the District of Columbia.

Sec. 3. This resolution shall take effect immediately upon the first date of publication in the District of Columbia Register.
