	WHEREAS, Johnny Lestant Gant, Sr. was born in Washington, DC on January 1, 1949,
1	to Lucille and John Robert Gant;
	WHEREAS, in 1968 Johnny L. Gant, Sr. launched a successful boxing career, winning
1	his first bout against Hurricane Hart at the DC Armory with a knockout-punch in Round 4;
	WHEREAS, Johnny L. Gant, Sr. worked for the DC Department of Recreation
	overseeing boxing shows;

40	WHEREAS, in 1978, Johnny L. Gant, Sr. won for successive fights including two
41	impressive victories over formidable fighters Jose Baquedano and Danny Gonzalez (then rated
42	No. 4 in the world);
43	WHEREAS, in January 1979, then World Class Professional Welterweight Champion
44	Boxer, Johnny L. Gant, Sr. gave boxing enthusiasts a thriller by competing against Sugar Ray
45	Leonard in Landover, Maryland at the filled-to-capacity Capitol Center, owned and operated by
46	the late Abe Pollin who was instrumental in putting DC boxing on the map and for designating
47	the Capitol Center as Gant's "home court";
48	WHEREAS, in 1979, Johnny L. Gant, Sr. and Sugar Ray Leonard were both managed by
49	Angelo Dundee, an internationally recognized giant in boxing circles and dubbed a leading
50	American boxing trainer and cornerman;
51	WHEREAS, in 1979 No. 2 ranked competitor, Johnny L. Gant, Sr. was prompted to leave
52	the boxing ring when the undefeated No. 1 ranked competitor, Sugar Ray Leonard, earned the
53	Regional Mid-Atlantic Title in the first DC area Home Box Office World Championship Boxing
54	match and was further spurred by his 1980 loss to Roger Leonard;
55	WHEREAS, after a decades long career in the boxing ring, Johnny L. Gant, Sr. collected
56	sixty-three total bouts under his belt, winning forty-five and ending three in a draw;
57	WHEREAS, Johnny L. Gant, Sr. turned his attention to exploring and pursuing options
58	beyond boxing. He used earnings from his bout with Sugar Ray Leonard to put himself through
59	college, studying computer programming and business administration at the University of the
60	District of Columbia;
61	WHEREAS, upon completing college, Johnny L. Gant, Sr. had a career with a computer
62	company in Southern California where he worked several years before moving back to

63	Washington, DC and later relocated to Atlanta where he worked for General Electric Computer
64	Systems Division in Alpharetta, GA;

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WHEREAS, Johnny L. Gant, Sr., acting upon his love for boxing, founded the Stone

66	Mountain Police Athletic League in Atlanta, GA, for youth tutoring and an amateur boxing
67	program for training young boxers;
68	WHEREAS, Johnny L. Gant, Sr. so loved boxing and his hometown- Washington, DC-
69	that he set a plan in motion to obtain the necessary funding to establish a boxing program in
70	Washington, DC;
71	WHEREAS, in 1997, at age 47, Johnny L. Gant, Sr. was encouraged to reenter the
72	boxing ring to fight Earl Allen, in (Gant vs. Allen). On February 1, 1997, the event was held at
73	the Richard England Boys and Girls Club, 4103 Benning Road, NE., with proceeds going to
74	support his goal of developing a non-profit boxing program in DC like the program he
75	established in Atlanta;
76	WHEREAS, Johnny L. Gant, Sr. established the Atlanta Art of Boxing Center in Atlanta
77	GA which became the base of operations for the Johnny Gant Foundation, created with his
78	daughter, Sirraya Gant, in Washington, DC;
79	WHEREAS, the Johnny Gant Foundation, a non-profit organization, develops sports-
80	centric programs for Atlanta area children providing them with constructive, focused outlets and
81	specialized attention and mentorship;
82	WHEREAS, Johnny L. Gant, Sr. coached and trained top professional and amateur
83	boxers at various skill levels for nearly two decades;
84	WHEREAS, as part of the Amateur Boxing Federation, Johnny L. Gant, Sr. coached the
85	Region III amateur team. Under his tutelage, the team, which consisted of 10 to 27-year-old

boxers, advanced to both the Olympic training center in Colorado Springs, Colorado to compete
for the National Championship, and the National Golden Gloves Championship tournament in
Milwaukee, Wisconsin;

WHEREAS, Johnny L. Gant, Sr. is a loving husband to his wife Brenda Gant. He was a
loving and supportive father to his children Sirraya Gant, John L. Gant Jr., Nakkiyah Gant, and
stepson Charles Renfrom, including the youths he trained who affectionately called him coach
and considered him a father figure;

93 WHEREAS, January 2, 2022 is Johnny L. Gant, Sr. Day;

94 WHEREAS, the District recognizes and celebrates Johnny L. Gant Sr.'s outstanding

95 humanitarianism and contributions to training athletes and the sport of boxing; his lifetime of
