The Executive Director position is Excepted Service and as such is exempted from an annual performance evaluation requirement. As a two-person Agency, the Executive Director provides ongoing feedback to the Executive Assistant. As such, an annual evaluation is unnecessary.

Response: The Commission maintains an applicant database via the District of Columbia government's secure SharePoint application. For each judicial applicant, the Commission uploads and maintains the applicant questionnaire, resume, letter of interest, writing samples, letters and emails submitted to the Commission regarding the applicant, online evaluations submitted, and a summary of the Commission's background investigation. The Commission's applicant database was launched in FY16. Only the Commissioners and the Commission's staff have access to the system.

In addition, the Commission began accepting application materials online via the District of Columbia government's secure SeamlessDocs application in March 2020. For each judicial applicant who chooses to submit their application materials electronically, the Commission uploads and maintains the applicant questionnaire, resume, letter of interest, writing samples, and requisite release and certification forms. Only the Commission's staff has access to the system.

10. Please describe the agency's procedures for investigating allegations of <u>sexual</u> <u>harassment</u> or misconduct committed by or against its employees. List and describe any allegations received by the agency in FY 2022 and FY 2023, to date, and whether and how those allegations were resolved.

Response: The Commission does not tolerate any form of sexual harassment in the workplace, and there have been no allegations of sexual harassment relating to the Commission or its employees in FY 2022 or FY 2023, to date. Should any allegations of sexual harassment, sexual misconduct, or discrimination committed by or against Commission employees arise, the Commission's Executive Director shall promptly notify and, as necessary, consult with the Mayor's Office of Legal Counsel (MOLC) to ensure that allegations of sexual harassment are investigated and resolved within sixty (60) days after receiving a report of sexual harassment, sexual misconduct, or discrimination. Provided that an investigation conducted by the Commission's Executive Director would not present a conflict of interest, the Commission's investigative procedures would include, but not be limited to, conducting a preliminary meeting with the individual reporting the sexual harassment allegation to understand and verify the allegation; interviewing the alleged victim of sexual harassment, third-party witnesses to the alleged sexual harassment, and the employee who allegedly engaged in the harassing behavior; obtaining and evaluating evidence; and completing a written investigation report that includes findings of fact and conclusions pertaining to the allegation.

If there are any allegations of sexual harassment, sexual misconduct, or discrimination committed by or against the Commission's Executive Director, or if an investigation conducted by the Commission's Executive Director would otherwise present a conflict of interest, the complainant is to contact the MOLC to ensure that an investigation is conducted and that appropriate action is taken.

The Commission meets when it has Commission business to resolve and when it considers applicants for a pending judicial vacancy or designation of a Chief Judge of either the Superior Court of the District of Columbia or the District of Columbia Court of Appeals. The Commission does not meet when it has no business to consider or act upon.

Per D.C. Code §1-204.34(c)(1) and (3), proceedings of the Commission are closed to the public, and D.C. Code §1-207.42 does not apply. In addition, information, records, and other materials furnished to, or developed by, the Commission during the performance of its duties are privileged and confidential. As a result, the Commission respectfully declines to list the attendance of each member at its meetings held in FY 2022 or FY 2023, to date.

Response: In FY 2020, the Commission initiated rulemaking action with the purposes of clarifying ambiguities in the procedures relating to the status of applicants on judicial nomination lists, the procedures that are to be followed when the Senate fails to confirm or returns a nomination, and certain application procedures for judicial candidates. In FY 2021, the Commission posted three vacancies pursuant to that rulemaking. In FY 2022, and FY 2023, to date, the Senate confirmed judges for two of the three vacancies. The rulemaking has resulted in improved transparency related to the judicial selection process in the District of Columbia.

The Commission publishes press releases reporting the Commission's recommendations on vacancies and Chief Judge designations on the Commission's website,

https://jnc.dc.gov/newsroom. The Commission also annually publishes its Report of Recommendations and Chief Judge Designations and Presidential Appointments to the District of Columbia Court of Appeals and the Superior Court of the District of Columbia https://jnc.dc.gov/publication/report-commission-recom. Further, the Commission updates its website with current vacancies and nominations on the D.C. Courts, https://jnc.dc.gov/page/current-vacancies-and-nominations. These publications have resulted in improved transparency related to the judicial selection process in the District of Columbia.

Response: The Commission does not have "customers" in the usual sense, although applicants for judicial vacancies could be considered the agency's customers. The Commission does not have a formal process for soliciting comments about the application process from applicants. However, the Commission updates its forms on an on-going basis and continually seeks ways to create a more user-friendly process as necessary. One example is the Commission having provided the applicants with the option to submit their applicants electronically beginning in March 2020.

Response: The Commission entered into an MOU with the United States Department of Justice Federal Bureau of Investigation (FBI), Information Management Division, on November 12, 2019; it remained in effect through September 30, 2022. On September 22, 2022, the Commission entered into another MOU with the FBI, Information Management Division; it will remain in effect through September 30, 2025, unless amended by mutual consent or terminated by the Commission or the FBI. The MOU addresses the Commission's use of the FBI National Name Check Program (NNCP), which the Commission uses to secure information concerning applicants for judicial vacancies, including the Commission's responsibilities, the FBI NNCP's responsibilities, and Privacy Act requirements. The Commission intends to enter into another MOU with the FBI upon the expiration of the current MOU.

The Commission also entered into an MOU with the United States Department of Treasury Internal Revenue Service (IRS) on August 30, 2019, which will remain in effect until September 30, 2024. The MOU addresses the Commission's use of the IRS's automated Tax Check Service. The IRS Tax Check Service allows the Commission to obtain IRS Tax Compliance Reports on applicants for judicial vacancies that provide information as to whether applicants have met their federal income tax obligations. These requests are made by submitting a standardized IRS Form 14767, Consent to Disclose Tax Compliance Check, that is completed and signed by judicial applicants. Prior to August 30, 2019, the Commission obtained confidential federal tax information for individuals who applied for judicial vacancies by submitting an appropriate waiver form, prepared by the Commission, to the IRS Tax Check Unit. However, beginning on July 1, 2019, the IRS transitioned to its automated Tax Check Service to implement the revised Federal Investigative Standards pursuant to Executive Order 13467, *Reforming Processes Related to Suitability for Government Employment, Fitness for Contractor Employees, and Eligibility for Access to Classified National Security Information.* As a consequence of this transition, the IRS requires the use of IRS Form 14767 to obtain federal tax compliance information.

The Commission also entered into an MOU with the District of Columbia Department of Human Resources (DCHR) on October 1, 2021; it remained in effect until September 30, 2022. On October 1, 2022, the Commission entered into another MOU with DCHR; it will remain in effect until September 30, 2023, unless amended or terminated by mutual consent. The MOU allows DCHR to serve as the personnel authority for the JNC, to include, among others, the following services: Benefits and Retirement; Recruitment and Staffing; Classification and Compensation.

Response: The Commission does not provide programs and services for District residents. The Commission's website is administered by the District of Columbia government which is responsible for ensuring that web content and applications are usable for persons with disabilities.

Response: The Commission does not have a racial or social equity statement or policy. The Commission evaluates each applicant on the basis of merit and recommends applicants to the President on that basis. The Commission solicits comments on

applicants according to the following criteria and evaluates applicants according to the same: (1) judicial temperament; (2) professional skills and abilities; (3) ethics; (4) commitment to diversity; (5) leadership and communication skills, (6) efficiency and organizational skills; (7) writing skills; and (8) community service. Following recommendation, District of Columbia judges are appointed by the President after being nominated by the President and confirmed by the United States Senate.

Response: As stated in answer to Question 20 above, the Commission entered an MOU with DCHR to serve as the personnel authority for the JNC, including, among others, recruitment, and staffing services. The Commission does not have an internal equal employment opportunity statement or policy independent of DCHR.

E. COVID-19 Pandemic Response

40. Please give an overview of any programs or initiatives the agency has started in response to COVID-19, to date, and whether each program or initiative is still in effect.

Response: The Commission began accepting application materials electronically via SeamlessDocs in March 2020. Before the implementation of SeamlessDocs, application materials had to be delivered to the Commission in paper format to ensure that applicants' personally identifying information (PII) was not placed at risk by the Commission during the application process. The Commission's use of SeamlessDocs modernized the application submission process by eliminating the need for applicants to deliver their application materials in-person during business hours or rely upon the United States Postal Service or other shipping provider for the timely submission of their application materials. The Commission's use of SeamlessDocs was critical to the application submission process during the nationwide shutdown in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. As expected, the availability of a secure web portal eased certain burdens for judicial applicants. By eliminating the need for the Commission's staff to manually scan and upload application materials to the Commission's shared drive and its electronic applicant database, the SeamlessDocs web portal also streamlined internal operations of the agency. The Commission continues to accept application materials using SeamlessDocs.

- 41. Which of the agency's divisions are currently working remotely?

Response: The Commission's Executive Director and Administrative Assistant currently work remotely.

42. How has the agency ensured that all staff have access to necessary equipment and a stable internet connection to work from home?

Response: The Commission's Executive Director and Administrative Assistant meet as needed to discuss any equipment needs or access-related issues. Currently, Commission staff have the necessary equipment and a stable internet connection to work from home.

43. Was the agency a recipient of any federal grants stemming related to the COVID-19 pandemic during FY 2022 and FY 2023, to date, and, if so, how were those federal grant dollars used?

Response: The Commission was not a recipient of any federal grants stemming from or related to the COVID-19 pandemic during FY 2022 and FY 2023, to date.

44. How has the agency updated its methods of communications and public engagement to connect with customers since the start of the pandemic?

Response: The Commission conducts live and "open conference call" outreach sessions to educate members of the District of Columbia legal community about the District of Columbia Courts' judicial selection process, provide practical advice for prospective applicants, and increase the number of qualified applicants for judicial vacancies.

F. Agency-Specific Questions (Part 2)

45. Please provide an update on all vacancies to the D.C. Courts.

Response: As of February 1, 2023, there are nine D.C. Courts vacancies, one on the District of Columbia Court of Appeals and eight on the Superior Court of the District of Columbia. Please see Attachment 7, which contains details regarding each of the vacancies.

a. How many additional vacancies due to retirement does the Commission anticipate by the end of calendar year 2023?

Response: The Commission posted notices for two vacancies, effective February 25, 2023. The Commission is not aware of any additional vacancies due to retirements by the end of calendar year 2023.

b. What has been the average vacancy length over the past five year?

Response: From calendar year 2018 to calendar year 2022, four judges have been confirmed to the District of Columbia Court of Appeals (DCCA) and twenty judges confirmed to the Superior Court of the District of Columbia (DCSC). The average vacancy length from the effective date of the vacancies to the confirmation dates was 461 days for the DCCA and 813 days for the DCSC. Please see Attachment 8, which contains detailed information. For each vacancy, the Commission met its statutory deadline to recommend applicants to the President.

c. Has the Executive Director begun (or perhaps completed) work OCTO to display vacancy information on the Commission website? If not, what is the status of that work?

Response: The Executive Director completed work with OCTO displaying vacancy information on the <u>Commission website</u> since March 2022.

46. What are the current qualifications required to be considered by the Commission? Please describe the application and review process, including the average timeline for review of an application.

Response: When a vacancy occurs, the Commission solicits applications via a notice on its website. As set forth in D.C. Code §1-204.33, persons eligible to be recommended must be:

- a United States citizen;
- an active member of the unified District of Columbia Bar;
- engaged in the active practice of law in the District of Columbia for the five years immediately preceding the nomination (serving as a law school professor or attorney in the U.S. or District of Columbia government expressly counts towards this requirement); and
- a bona fide resident of the District of Columbia, with an "actual place of abode in the District."

In addition to determining whether applicants meet the statutory eligibility criteria, the Commission evaluates applicants' integrity, professional competence, experience, judicial temperament, and involvement in the District of Columbia community. This evaluation is accomplished through review of the application submitted to the JNC, a background investigation, and personal interviews. A copy of the JNC Outreach Pamphlet explaining the applicant process accompanies this letter.

a. Where an applicant is not selected to fill a particular vacancy, is their application held by the Commission and considered for future vacancies for which the applicant could be qualified? If yes, please describe this process.

Response: If an applicant is not recommended to the President to fill a particular vacancy, the applicant must re-apply to be considered for another vacancy. If an

applicant submitted a complete, timely application for judicial vacancy within twelve months of the date another vacancy is announced, the applicant does not need to resubmit the entire application. The applicant needs only to submit a one-page certification via Form JNC 21A.

47. Please provide details on racial, ethnic, and gender demographics of judges serving on the D.C. Courts, broken down by the Superior Court and Court of Appeals. How does the Commission work to attract diverse candidates to fill vacancies?

Response: The Commission does not track details on racial, ethnic, and gender demographics of judges serving in the D.C. Courts.

The Commission works with bar associations, law schools, institutional litigants, and other interested organizations in the District to improve its outreach efforts and increase the number of outreach sessions, both virtually and in-person when appropriate, that target a broad and diverse range of attorneys.

48. How many times did the agency meet in FY 2022 and FY 2023, to date? What percentage of members were present at each meeting?

Response: The Commission meets when it has Commission business to resolve and when it considers applicants for a pending judicial vacancy or designation of a Chief Judge of either the Superior Court of the District of Columbia or the District of Columbia Court of Appeals. The Commission does not meet when it has no business to consider or act upon. The Commission convened during the following months in FY 2022 and FY 2023, to date:

FY 2022: November 2021, December 2021, March 2022, May 2022, July 2022

FY 2023: December 2022 and January 2023

Per D.C. Code §1-204.34(c)(1) and (3), proceedings of the Commission are closed to the public, and D.C. Code §1-207.42 does not apply. In addition, information, records, and other materials furnished to, or developed by, the Commission during the performance of its duties are privileged and confidential. As a result, the Commission respectfully declines to list the attendance of each member at its meetings held in FY 2022 or FY 2023, to date.

a. Did the Commission ever have to postpone or cancel a meeting due to failing to meet quorum?

Response: No, the Commission has not had to postpone or cancel a meeting due to failing to meet quorum.

b. Are there currently any vacancies on the Commission? What is the status of filling those vacancies?

Response: There are no vacancies on the Commission.

c. Which Commission members, if any, will have their term end during calendar year 2023?

Response: The term of one Commission member will expire during calendar year 2023. However, Commissioners usually continue to serve until their replacement is named. See Attachment 3, JNC Commissioners List.

49. Have there been increases in the number of online applications submitted in FY 2022 and FY 2023, to date, as compared to the same time frame in FY 2021 and FY22 (as of the date of the agency's last pre-hearing responses)?

Response: The Commission received 100% of its applications through its web-based application portal in FY 2022 and FY 2023, to date, the same percentage received in FY 2021 and FY 2022.

50. Please provide a list of outreach sessions the agency planned in FY 2022 and FY 2023, to date, and the number of individuals in attendance at those sessions.

- a. Did the sessions lead to an increased number of applicants?
- b. Did the agency endeavor to reach out to diverse groups of candidates through these sessions?
- c. Does the agency have plans to increase the number of sessions that are held?

Response: (a) In FY 2022 and FY 2023, to date, there has been an average of fifteen applicants per vacancy posted for the Superior Court, which is an increase in the average number of applicants per vacancy at the Superior Court in FY 2021, when there was an average of twelve applicants per vacancy. There were eleven first-time applicants for six Superior Court vacancies posted in FY 2022 and FY 2023, to date, compared to sixteen first-time applicants for seven Superior Court vacancies posted in FY 2021. The Commission plans to continue conducting outreach sessions, both virtually and in-person when appropriate, to target a broad range of highly qualified and diverse applicants.

(b) Yes. In FY 2022 and FY 2023, to date, the Commission has worked with the D.C. Bar Voluntary Bar Leadership and the Hispanic Bar Association Judicial Pipeline Academy to conduct virtual outreach sessions. Through these sessions, the Commission's outreach efforts have resulted in increased applicants. The Commission also shares vacancy information through GovDelivery to the United States Department of Justice, the United States Attorney's Office for the District of Columbia, and other interested organizations to target lawyers in various sectors (private, public, commercial, etc.) and in voluntary bar associations reflecting the diversity of the District's legal community. See Attachment 9, JNC Outreach Events.

(c) Yes. The Commission plans to work with bar associations in the District, District of Columbia law schools, and other interested organizations to improve its outreach efforts

and to increase the number of outreach sessions, both virtually and in person, when appropriate.

In addition, the Commission continues to hold "Open Conference Calls," to which anyone interested in the judicial application process can call in to learn about it and ask any questions they might have. The Commission holds weekly Open Conference Calls when it accepts applications for judicial vacancies to allow prospective applicants to participate in outreach sessions remotely and anonymously. The Calls are during the workday, and information about these sessions is posted on the Commission's website and circulated via social media. In FY 2022 and FY 2023, to date, the Commission hosted 26 calls. Participation rates vary; however, to date, more than 60 prospective applicants have been reached.

- 51. Please provide the Committee with an update on the Commission's progress in achieving the five priorities shared with the Committee in the Commission's FY 2021 performance oversight responses. Specifically:
 - a. Timely recommend to the President of the United States a list of three persons for possible nomination for each vacancy on the District of Columbia Court of Appeals (DCCA) and the Superior Court of the District of Columbia (Superior Court);
 - b. Timely designate Chief Judges for the DCCA and the Superior Court;
 - c. Timely publicize vacancies on the DCCA and the Superior Court;
 - d. Conduct regular outreach sessions to educate the legal community about the judicial application and selection process; and
 - e. Maintain a secure electronic applicant database and application web portal to streamline the application and review processes, while maintaining appropriate data safeguards.

Response: The Commission continues to track judicial terms and maintains close contact with the District of Columbia Courts leadership and the District of Columbia Commission on Judicial Disabilities and Tenure. By doing so, the Commission can ensure that it timely identifies and publicizes upcoming vacancies. Timely identifying and publicizing vacancies has and will continue to enable the Commission to receive and process applications within a sufficient timeframe to conduct thorough background investigations, request and receive public comment on candidates, carefully consider applications, and make recommendations to the President within the statutory deadline.

The Commission continues to work with bar associations, law schools, institutional litigants, and other interested organizations in the District to improve its outreach efforts and increase the number of outreach sessions, both virtually and in-person when appropriate, that target a broad and diverse range of attorneys.

The Commission continues to maintain a password-controlled applicant database via the District of Columbia government's secure SharePoint application. For each judicial applicant, the Commission uploads application materials for each vacancy to the secure platform. Only the Commissioners and the Commission's staff may access the secure

platform, and the Commission works to ensure that applicants' PII is not placed at risk by the Commission during the application process.

The Commission continues to accept application materials electronically. All applicants in FY 2022 and FY 2023, to date, opted to submit their application materials electronically using the District of Columbia government's secure SeamlessDocs application. Upon submission, applicants can download a PDF summary that includes the date and time of their submission, along with an itemized report of the materials that they submitted. Once an application is submitted using the SeamlessDocs application, the Commission's staff receive instant notification of the submission via email, which allows the Commission's staff to upload application materials promptly and efficiently to its secure applicant database.

- 52. How does the Commission generally track and respond legislative mandates that may affect the number of judges serving on the D.C. Courts?
 - a. Certain provisions within the Revised Criminal Code Act of 2022 may require an increase in the number of judges serving on the D.C. Courts. How is the Commission working with the Courts to plan for any increase in the number of judges necessitated by the law, and identify potential nominees to fill those positions?

Response: The Commission maintains close contact with the District of Columbia Courts leadership. By doing so, the Commission can ensure that it timely identifies and publicizes upcoming vacancies, including vacancies that may be created by the Revised Criminal Code Act of 2022. Timely identifying and publicizing vacancies has and will continue to enable the Commission to receive and process applications within a sufficient timeframe to conduct thorough background investigations, request and receive public comment on candidates, carefully consider applications, and make recommendations to the President.

53. Please identify whether, and if so, in what way, the agency engaged The Lab @ DC in FY 2021 or FY22, to date.

Response: The Commission did not engage the Lab @ DC in FY 2021 or FY 2022, to date. Similarly, the Commission did not engage the Lab @ DC in FY 2022 or FY 2023, to date.

54. Please describe the Commission's relationship with the Commission on Judicial Disabilities and Tenure.

Response: The Commission has no formal relationship with the Commission on Judicial Disabilities and Tenure (CJDT). Each agency was established with differing statutory mandates under the Home Rule Act, D.C. Code §1-204.34 and D.C. Code §1-204.33, respectively. In fulfilling its statutory mandate to send a list of three persons for possible nomination for each vacancy on the District of Columbia courts, the Commission annually inquires of the CJDT the names of judges whose terms are expiring and who are

subject to mandatory retirement. The Commission uses this information to anticipate the number of vacancies it might have to post during the year.

55. Are there any barriers, statutory or otherwise, that unnecessarily slow or hamper the Commission's work?

Response: There are no barriers, statutory or otherwise, that unnecessarily slow or hamper the Commission's work.

a. Does the Commission have sufficient staff support?

Response: Yes, the Commission has sufficient staff support.

b. How could the Committee better support the work of the Commission?

Response: The Commission appreciates the Committee's support and is committed to performing its statutory responsibilities in service to the residents of the District of Columbia.

District of Columbia Judicial Nomination Commission Report of Recommendations and Chief Judge Designations and Presidential Appointments to the District of Columbia Court of Appeals and the Superior Court of the District of Columbia May 8, 1975 to September 30, 2022

INTRODUCTION

On October 31, 2011, at the suggestion of Addy Schmitt, Esq., and the tireless and meticulous efforts of Ms. Schmitt; Kim Whatley, the former Executive Director of the District of Columbia Judicial Nomination Commission ("JNC" or "Commission"); and Joseph R.A. Fruth, Summer Intern, the JNC published an historic report of recommendations made to the President of the United States, Presidential appointments to the District of Columbia courts, and the JNC's designations of the Chief Judges for those courts, with the commitment to update the report annually. Information in this update is current through September 30, 2022.

The District of Columbia Court of Appeals and the Superior Court of the District of Columbia were established by Congress on July 29, 1970 (Pub. L. No. 91-358, 84 Stat. 473). The District of Columbia Judicial Nomination Commission was established by Congress on December 24, 1973 (Publ. L. No. 93-198, 87 Stat. 795). The JNC is composed of seven members — two appointed by the Mayor of the District of Columbia, two by the Board of Governors of the District of Columbia Bar Association (Unified), one by the Council of the District of Columbia, one by the President of the United States, and one judicial member appointed by the Chief Judge of the United States District Court for the District of Columbia. Each member is appointed for a six-year term, except the member appointed by the President, who is appointed for a five-year term.

The mission of the JNC is to provide the citizens of the District of Columbia with the best possible court system by (a) soliciting a diverse and talented pool of applicants for each judicial vacancy; (b) screening applicants to ensure they have the requisite experience, skill, temperament, and qualifications for judicial office; and (c) recommending the three most qualified applicants to the President of the United States for his or her consideration in selecting a nominee to fill each judicial vacancy on the District of Columbia Court of Appeals and the Superior Court of the District of Columbia. The JNC also designates the Chief Judges of the District of Columbia courts for four-year terms.

In creating this report, the JNC has endeavored to ensure accuracy and completeness. Please bring any errors to the JNC's attention, so they may be corrected as soon as practicable.



District of Columbia come from a wide variety of professional, social, economic, and educational backgrounds. The JNC evaluates each applicant on the basis of merit, and recommends applicants to the President on that basis. Following recommendation, District of Columbia judges are appointed only after being nominated by the President and confirmed by the United States Senate.



District of Columbia Judicial Nomination Commission

ASSESSING YOUR CANDIDACY

The JNC is responsible for recommending to the President three persons for possible nomination for each vacancy on the District of Columbia courts. D.C. Code § 1-204.34(d)(1). When a vacancy occurs, the JNC solicits applications via a notice on its website. As set forth in D.C. Code § 1-204.33, persons eligible to be recommended must be:

- a United States citizen;
- an active member of the unified District of Columbia Bar;
- engaged in the active practice of law in the District of Columbia for the five years immediately preceding the nomination (serving as a law school professor or attorney in the U.S. or District of Columbia government expressly counts towards this requirement); and
- a bona fide resident of the District of Columbia, with an "actual place of abode in the District."

Individuals who have served on either the JNC or the District of Columbia Commission on Judicial Disabilities and Tenure within the past two years are not eligible for recommendation.

Judges on the District of Columbia courts must retire at the age of 74, D.C. Code § 11-502, but there is no minimum requirement for serving on the District of Columbia courts. According to a study conducted by the Council for Court Excellence, between 1994 and 2011, nominees ranged in age from 33 to 60 years of age, with an average age of 47 at the time of nomination. How the District of Columbia Gets Its Judges, Council for Court Excellence (DC 2011).

In addition to determining whether applicants meet the statutory eligibility criteria, the JNC evaluates applicants' integrity, professional competence, experience, judicial temperament, and involvement in the District of Columbia community. This evaluation is accomplished through review of the application submitted to the JNC, a background investigation, and personal interviews.

The Applicant Questionnaire, JNC Form 21, provides an overview of the types of professional experience and community involvement that will be important in assessing your candidacy. Keeping up-to-date records of the items listed below will make it easier for you to complete your application:

- Educational background, including degrees, honors, and awards received.
- Bar and court admission(s), including dates, status, and administrative bodies that require special admission.
- Chronological employment experience after law school.
- The nature of your legal practice and client base, including areas of specialization.
- Detailed information for the past five years about court appearances, trials, settlements, and appeals.
- Summary information about your career prior to the past five years.
- List of the five most significant legal matters for which you were responsible, or, if you have none, the contributions you have made in other areas related to the law including teaching, court administration, rule-making, alternate dispute resolution, etc.
- Information about any prior judicial or elective offices you have held.
- Other, non-legal experience.
- Information relating to possible conflicts of interest (e.g., current business interests).
- Your history of tax compliance, involvement in legal proceedings, and any encounters with the criminal justice system.
- Your professional responsibility and ethics track record.
- Your membership in professional and other associations.
- A list of legal books or articles published, with citations.

A word to the wise: As the JNC conducts a background investigation on each applicant, and if you are nominated, the White House and Senate will conduct further investigations, it is best to err on the side of inclusion in your application materials. It does not bode well for a candidate if issues arise during these investigations that contradict information in the application. Keep track of your obligations, personal (e.g., taxes, other debts) and professional (e.g., bar dues), and stay on top of them.

The JNC's RECOMMENDATION PROCESS

If you believe you have the experience, expertise, and temperament to serve as a judge on the District of Columbia courts, check the JNC website at <u>www.jnc.dc.gov</u> for vacancy announcements and invitations to apply. Sign up there for the JNC listserv so that you will be notified when a vacancy occurs.

Applications are usually due 30 days after a vacancy is announced, and no late applications are accepted. The current version of the application materials will be available at the JNC website.

Pay close attention to the instructions for applying as your attention to detail is one element of your application.

After You Submit Your Application

The JNC announces the names of all applicants for each vacancy on the website and solicits public input through either a confidential online survey or letters. Once you have decided to apply, ask judges before whom you have appeared, colleagues, and opposing counsel to fill out the online survey or write a letter on your behalf. If you are recommended by the JNC to the President for possible nomination, you may wish to consider asking your references to write a letter to the President on your behalf as the JNC does not share survey results or letters with the White House.

The JNC also conducts an investigation into your professional background, which includes a credit check, tax check, education verification, employment verification, and contact with any bars or courts to which you are admitted. You will be contacted if the JNC has follow-up questions.

The JNC may speak with current and former colleagues, judges before whom you have appeared, as well as co-counsel and opposing counsel in your cases.

The JNC interviews all first-time applicants who meet the basic, statutory qualifications. The Commission may also re-interview applicants who are re-applying. Be prepared to discuss your qualifications – beyond the information you provided in your application. You may be asked hypotheticals to help the JNC get a sense of your decision-making style and temperament. Commissioners may be available for individual applicant meetings at the discretion of the Commissioner.

If you are not recommended to the President, do not be discouraged from applying for a future recommendation. Given the depth of talent and commitment to public service in the District of Columbia legal community, the candidate pool is quite strong. It is not uncommon for lawyers to apply several times before being recommended to the President.

THE NOMINATION PROCESS

Once your name has been forwarded to the White House, the President has 60 days within which to nominate a candidate for the vacancy. At this point, the White House will conduct its investigation and may contact you for an interview.

Even if you are not nominated for the vacancy for which the JNC recommended you, until that vacancy has actually been filled with a nominee confirmed by the Senate, you remain a viable candidate to be nominated for *any* vacancy on the same court. If you are in this position, feel free to contact the JNC if you have any questions.

THE CONFIRMATION PROCESS

After the President submits your nomination to the Senate, it will be forwarded to the Committee on Homeland Security & Governmental Affairs ("Committee") for action. You can track the progress of your nomination on the Committee's website: <u>http://www.hsgac.senate.gov/</u> The Committee may schedule a hearing, and may request you to submit responses to its own questionnaire.

What to Expect at a Committee Hearing

The Committee hearing is intended to be a question and answer session. Some or all of the Committee members will attend the hearing, depending on the Senate's calendar and their availability. If a senator does not attend, he or she may have staff attend and report back. The questions posed typically address the individual's qualifications, understanding of how to interpret and apply the law, previous experience in court, judicial temperament, as well as the role of judges. You should, however, be prepared to speak about the entirety of your legal career, writings, and speaking engagements. You may wish to view hearings online at the Committee's website (search "Associate Judge" on the Hearings page to review past hearings).

After the hearing, you may receive written follow-up questions from Committee members. The written follow-up may address issues not raised in the hearing, or may seek more information about issues that arose during the hearing.

For your nomination to proceed past the hearing stage, a majority of Committee members must support it.

Senate Votes

Once the hearing and any follow-up conclude, you need two votes to move forward with your nomination: (1) a Committee vote to report your nomination to the Senate, and (2) a confirmation vote on the Senate floor. The floor vote is scheduled by the Majority Leader.

Once reported by the Committee, you need to receive a majority vote in the Senate to be confirmed.

Even if your nomination has been reported to the Senate, it may still be returned to the President. This occurs when either the Committee or the Senate takes no action on your nomination. Senate rules provide that any nomination pending when the Senate adjourns or recesses for more than 30 days is returned to the President. Standing Rules of the Senate, Rule XXXI, ¶ 6. This typically occurs at the end of each two-year Congress. If this happens, as explained above, you remain in the candidate pool at the White House, and may be nominated for the same or different vacancy on the same court, *until the vacancy for which you were recommended has been filled.*

Timing

There is no time limit within which the Senate must act on nominations to the District of Columbia courts. Feel free to discuss the pace of confirmations with the JNC in order to understand what you might expect. While your nomination is pending, and while you remain an active candidate at the White House, keep track of the same information you developed when preparing your application. Any aspect of your professional life, or personal events to the extent they relate to your fitness for office, may be considered – including those that occur after you submit your application.

PATHS TO THE DISTRICT OF COLUMBIA COURTS

There is not just one path to the courts in the District of Columbia, but one of the most common is to have courtroom experience. In addition, half of the candidates recommended to the White House since 2010 had experience as a federal or state judicial law clerk.

Candidates recommended to the President by the JNC reflect the makeup of the District of Columbia legal community: between 1994 and 2015, approximately 30% came from the private and non-profit sectors, and approximately 70% from local or federal government positions.

Superior Court judges generally are assigned to one or more of the Court's divisions during their fifteen years within the courts – Civil, Criminal, Family Court, Probate, Tax, and the Domestic Violence Unit. Some lawyers recommended have specialized experience, having focused throughout their career on one broad substantive area of law (criminal prosecution, criminal defense, civil, or family law), while others have a more diverse background.
