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13	To declare the existence of an emergency with respect to the need to amend the Comprehensive
14	Policing and Justice Reform Amendment Act of 2022 to clarify when law enforcement officers
15	have authority to engage in a vehicular pursuit of a suspect motor vehicle.

18	resolution may be cited as the "Law Enforcement Vehicular Pursuit Clarification Emergency
19	Declaration Resolution of 2023".
20	Sec. 2. (a) On April 21, 2023, the Comprehensive Policing and Justice Reform Act of
21	2022 went into effect. The law includes a provision limiting the circumstances under which law
22	enforcement officers can engage in a vehicle pursuit.
23	(b) The law allows pursuits only in cases where an officer actually and reasonably
24	believes that a fleeing suspect has committed or attempted a crime of violence or poses an
25	immediate threat of death or serious bodily injury to another person. It also requires that the
26	officer reasonably believe the pursuit is immediately necessary to protect another person from
27	the threat of serious injury or death; that the pursuit is not likely to cause serious bodily injury or
28	death to any person; and that all other options have been exhausted or do not reasonably lend
29	themselves to the circumstances.

30 (c) The Metropolitan Police Department ("MPD") has informed the Council that in
31 drafting a written pursuit directive for its officers to comply with this language, it has come to
32 the conclusion that, in practice, the sole option available to it is to implement a no-pursuit policy.
33 (d) No other jurisdiction in the United States has a no-pursuit policy. Adoption of such a
34 policy would have substantial detrimental impacts to public safety. Two recent incidents
35 illustrate this:

36 (1) On June 21, 2023, an individual carjacked a vehicle with a 6-year-old child in
37 the back seat. MPD was unable to use a helicopter to follow the vehicle due to weather
38 conditions. Officers were unable to pursue the vehicle.

39 (2) On June 23, 2023, multiple individuals committed a carjacking. They fled in
40 the vehicle and went on to commit five armed robberies over the course of multiple hours in the
41 U Street corridor. Officers were unable to pursue because there was no "immediate" threat and
42 they could not ensure the safety of the fleeing driver. The driver appeared to be aware of MPD's
43 inability to pursue; he waved at an MPD officer as he drove by.

(f) To avoid these negative impacts to public safety, this emergency legislation makes clarifying changes to the limitation on vehicle pursuits to ensure that MPD can authorize its officers to engage in pursuits when necessary. The legislation would retain strict limits on pursuits, allowing them only where the fleeing suspect has committed a crime of violence or poses an imminent threat to public safety and where pursuit is necessary and can be conducted in a way that mitigates the risk of injury to innocent people.

Sec. 3. The Council of the District of Columbia determines that the circumstances
 enumerated in section 2 constitute emergency circumstances making it necessary that the Law
