Answer: MOLA collaborated with DOES Office of Youth Programs to provide access to the Marion S. Barry Summer Youth Employment Program ("MBSYEP"), which offers a six-week summer employment experience for youth ages 14 to 24. This program was successful because it provided a safe, positive work environment that allowed youth to develop necessary skills and training needed to be employable in the future. SYEP FY24 had 240 students applying to become participants of the program, and 105 of those youth were selected to participate. MOLA will continue this collaboration during FY2025.

a. What has the Office learned from this feedback?

Answer: Through this feedback, the Office has identified several recurring trends:

Increased demand for housing and employment assistance: Many constituents seek support with affordable housing applications and job opportunities.

Need for more accessible information: Language barriers and a lack of awareness about government services have been frequently cited as challenges.

Growing interest in small business support: There has been an increasing demand for resources and guidance on business financing and regulatory compliance.

b. How has the Office changed its practices in response to this feedback?

Answer: In response, the Office has improved communication channels and increased outreach efforts to Latino residents.

Expanded Spanish-language resources: More informational materials have been translated, and outreach campaigns in Spanish have been strengthened to ensure constituents can access critical information.

"MOLA in the Streets": We are planning this year to visit different areas of the city through the itinerant office.

- 27. How does the Office assess whether programs and services are equitably accessible to all District residents?
 - a. What were the results of any such assessments in FY24 and FY25-to-date?

Answer:

Language barriers remain a significant challenge: Many residents continue to face difficulties accessing services due to limited English proficiency.

Limited awareness of available resources: Many residents, particularly new immigrants and low-income families, are unaware of the services provided by the DC Government and how to access them.

b. What changes did the Office make in FY24 and FY25-to-date, or does the Office plan to make in FY24 and beyond, to address identified inequities in access to programs and services?

Answer: Expansion of Mobile Outreach Services: The Office has launched mobile outreach initiatives to bring services directly to underserved communities.

c. Does the Office have the resources needed to undertake these assessments? What would be needed for the Office to more effectively identify and address inequities in access to Office programs and services?

Answer: The Office has made progress in assessing service equity through staff capacity, data analysis tools, and community outreach efforts.

28. Please provide the frequency and circulation of, and engagement with, your newsletter, as well as any plans to increase engagement FY24 and FY25-to-date.

Answer: Frequency: The Office publishes a monthly newsletter that highlights key events, resources, and initiatives available to the Latino community in Washington, DC. Circulation: The newsletter is distributed to a subscriber list of over 27,000 recipients. Social Media Amplification: Newsletter content is also shared across the Office's social media platforms.

29. Please describe the Office's use of social media, text messages, reports, and other means of communicating with constituents, including the number of followers, engagement, and frequency of posts and messages sent out quarterly in FY24 and FY25-to-date.

Answer: MOLA actively uses various social media platforms to disseminate information and engage with constituents:

Text Messaging and Newsletters through GovDelivery: MOLA produces and distributes a newsletter to inform constituents about programs, services, and upcoming events. The newsletter is disseminated via email and text messaging and is also accessible through MOLA's social media channels. MOLA offers a text messaging service to provide timely

updates and information to constituents. This service ensures that essential announcements and resources are accessible to those who may prefer or rely on mobile communications.

Social Media Channels: MOLA amplifies communications from DC government agencies translating and reposting graphics and information in Spanish. Through social media channels the agency is able publish regular updates on events, resources, and community

highlights.

32. Did the Office conduct oversight of the organizations to which it awards grants to ensure funds are used as intended? If so, please describe the oversight and any metrics used to determine compliance with the grant requirements.

Answer: Yes, MOLA conducted monitoring site visits to all its community-based grants to ensure funds are used as intended. Before each site visit is executed the grants department meets to ensure the grantee has been complying with the grant's guidelines listed in the agreement and highlight items that must be up to date, if any. During the site visit itself the MOLA grants monitor discusses a series of 38 questions with the grantee to ensure that the program is running smoothly and to make sure they do not have any questions or concerns.

33. Of the organizations that received a community-based grant in FY24, how many also received community-based grants in FY25-to-date?

Answer: 70 programs from returning grantees were awarded in FY24. In FY25, 69 programs from returning grantees have been awarded, to date.

34. Please explain the process for publishing and publicizing the grants, determining eligibility, and reviewing grants. How is this information being advertised for the community?

Answer:

Every fiscal year MOLA releases to the public a request for proposal via its social media, DC Grants Clearinghouse, the DC Register, and DC Funding Alert to receive proposals to serve DC Latino community in several areas of interest.

Eligibility Criteria

Organizations that meet the following eligibility requirements at the time of application may be eligible:

- •Be a Community-Based Organization (CBO) with a Federal 501(c)(3) tax-exempt status or evidence of fiscal agent relationship with a 501 (c)(3) organization;
- The organization or program serves the District's Latino residents or business owners;
- The organization's principal place of business is located in the District of Columbia;
- •All services and programming to receive funds must be provided in the District of Columbia;
- The organization is currently registered in good standing with the DC Department of Licensing and Consumer Protection, Corporation Division, and the Office of Tax and Revenue;
- Current grantees must be current on any reporting obligations for the previous grant cycle and progress towards deliverables will be considered.

Review Process

MOLA uses an independent review panel that will submit recommendations for funding. The review panel is composed of neutral, qualified individuals selected for their experiences with health, education, housing, legal, public safety, business, employment, and other related expertise, or grants administration and non-profit management. The panel members will review and score applicant proposals and submit recommendations for awards.

An internal review panel comprised of the Directors from the Mayor's Office on Asian & Pacific Islander Affairs, the Mayor's Office on Latino Affairs and the Mayor's Office on African Affairs will prepare an assessment that will be submitted to the Grant Advisory Review Board (GARB), after taking under consideration the external independent review panel's recommendations.

Based on the external and internal review panel recommendations, the Mayor's budget priorities, the financial resources available, and to achieve a balance as to communities served and the goals of the program, GARB will make the final funding decision. The GARB is the Grant Advisory Review Board (GARB), which is composed by the Mayor's General Counsel, the Director of the Mayor's Office on Community Affairs and the Director of the Office of Partnerships and Grant Services (OPGS). GARB's final funding decisions cannot be contested.

Final decisions will be made based on the scores and such other factors and considerations as the district deems relevant at the time of award, which may include updated consideration of how well the applicant has performed on prior grants; grant administrators with prior experience with applicants; and the input and expert opinion of relevant agency Directors.
